

Father Paul Writes - 17th of September, 2023

I welcome you today as we come together during this Season of Creation to reflect on our loving response to God on this Stewardship Sunday. Today culminates our focus for this year, in giving our time, our talents and our treasure to

God. It has been a time starting on January the 1st where we committed to spiritual growth, then at the celebration of Pentecost, in committing to serve God according to our spiritual gifts and now considering our treasure, that is our financial commitment to the parish. This is certainly not a stewardship campaign, no commitment cards to fill out, just a time to consider prayerfully our financial giving for the parish. It is a necessary expression of what we say and believe. It aims to be a lifestyle that places God in the middle of our lives, living as God intended for us as disciples and stewards of God's creation and what we give to God in our time, talent and treasure. Following the service at 10 am you are welcome to join us for a barbecue lunch. Please bring along a salad or a sweet dish to share along with your own drinks.

Our Christian Introductory Course Alpha continues this afternoon at 5 pm in the meeting room adjacent to the church. This afternoon's topic is called "How Does God Guide Us". Another interesting topic where we watch a video and have discussion. It will start with welcome refreshments and a light meal. If you have not been to one of these sessions, you are most welcome. Next Saturday, starting at 9.30 am in St Stephen's Chapel, we will hold a mini retreat or quiet day focussing on the Holy Spirit and what this means to us. Lunch will be provided but if you are able to bring along something to share, that would be great. The day retreat aims to be finished by 3.30 pm. Sarah McConaghy from Burnside Council will present the seminar on how to have best practice regarding waste management, reducing gas emissions and caring for our environment. This is an opportunity to bring your pets along for a blessing and to invite other pet owners to bring them along as well. It's always a wonderful time to give thanks for our animal companions.

It's been decided to postpone our Quiz Night to Friday night the 23rd of February. The decision was made at this week's Parish Council, due to various reasons including the short time frame left to organise it and in making a final decision on the recipients of the fundraiser. It was agreed that the funds raised will be split between the Parish and our Parish fundraiser for the year, Newton Theological College in PNG. Speaking of which, the students at the college were most grateful when informed that our Parish was donating money to the college.
