A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.'

Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne. When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. They sing a new song:

"You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals,
for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints
from every tribe and language and people and nation;
you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God,
and they will reign on earth."

Then I looked, and I heard the voice of many angels surrounding the throne and the living creatures and the elders; they numbered myriads of myriads and thousands of thousands, singing with full voice,

"Worthy is the Lamb that was slaughtered to receive power and wealth
and wisdom and might and honour and glory and blessing!"

¹ After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. ² Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. ³ Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. ⁴ Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵ Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' ⁶ He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. ⁷ That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. ⁸ But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off. ⁹ When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. ¹⁰ Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.' ¹¹ So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. ¹² Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. ¹³ Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. ¹⁴ This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead. ¹⁵ When

they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, ‘Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?’ He said to him, ‘Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.’ Jesus said to him, ‘Feed my lambs.’ ¹⁶ A second time he said to him, ‘Simon son of John, do you love me?’ He said to him, ‘Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.’ Jesus said to him, ‘Tend my sheep.’ ¹⁷ He said to him the third time, ‘Simon son of John, do you love me?’ Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, ‘Do you love me?’ And he said to him, ‘Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.’ Jesus said to him, ‘Feed my sheep. ¹⁸ Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.’ ¹⁹ (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, ‘Follow me.’ *NRSV John 21.1-19*

Pew Reflections

Easter 3 C – Sunday 4 May 2025

- Acts 9.1-6 [7-20]; Psalm 30; Revelation 5.6-14; John 21.1-19

In today's Gospel reading the disciples do not immediately recognise the risen Jesus, just as the disciples on the road to Emmaus and Mary Magdalene in the garden at the tomb did not. However, when he commands them to throw out the nets and they bring in a full catch (cf Luke 5) they realise exactly who he is.

- Lord, help the scales to fall from my eyes so that I recognise you each time I encounter you in the world.
- Give thanks for the work and witness of the Church of the Province of Myanmar.

Father Paul writes – 4th of May 2025 – 3rd Sunday of Easter

I welcome you all as we continue to celebrate Christ Risen in this season of Easter. On this third Sunday of Easter, we hear the story of Simon Peter, who recognised the risen Lord because of the abundant catch of fish that happened when Peter followed his directions. Peter had denied Jesus three times during his trial before the Jewish High Priest; now, Jesus gives him the chance to insist three times that he does indeed love Jesus. Peter's love is now directed by Jesus, the Good Shepherd, to feeding Jesus' sheep. Jesus suggests to Peter what this new ministry of servant leadership will cost him, even to the way he will die, a way that Jesus endured on a cross. We also hear in our first reading of the conversion of Saul, who became the apostle Paul, one of the great missionaries of the early Church.

We begin today in this Season of Easter and as part of Hope25, a course called "Hope Explored". It is a course held over three sessions for about an hour or so on the hope we have in Jesus Christ as our Saviour. It focuses on his life, his death and his resurrection and is based on Luke's Gospel. This course is open to everyone, whether you are an enquirer to Christianity or whether you would like to know more about the life of Jesus and the hope this brings to all of us. The first session today begins at midday with a light lunch and it will be repeated next Friday night the 9th of May from 6 pm with wine and cheese and other light food. The following two sessions will be offered on the following two Sundays and two Fridays at the same time respectively. There is a sheet at the back of the church if you would like to register or just come along. There are also invitations at the back of the church along with copies of Luke's Gospel for anyone who you would like to invite.

This afternoon at 4 pm at St David's Burnside is the commissioning service for the chaplains at our local schools. The chaplains otherwise known as pastoral care workers offer support to students and staff. The chaplains are in part funded by the Federal Government with supplementary funds through the Burnside Interchurch Council. Please come along and support the chaplains as they are commissioned for the year. They certainly need our encouragement.

Burnside's Mayor Anne Monceaux will be the guest speaker at the next friendship lunch on Tuesday from midday in the meeting room next to the church. Mayor Anne will speak about her faith journey and in the context of being the Mayor of Burnside. The lunch is open to all parishioners and especially if you are new to the parish or wish to bring someone else along, a neighbour or a friend. The cost is just ten dollars which includes a two-course meal along with wine. Please mark your name and the number coming on the sheet at the back of the church, otherwise ring Sue Lewis on 0431 151 552 to book.

The parish computer system has been upgraded over the past week to make it compatible with Windows 11. The computer system has been on Windows 10 for quite a few years and needed to be upgraded before October this year. We were fortunate through a computer technician to have it upgraded, without buying a completely new system. The cost of the upgrade was 600-dollars. I am happy to provide support and training for anyone wishing to be an intercessor and for anyone wishing to be a lay assistant, that is serving at the 10 am Sung Eucharist. Sue Lewis is also willing to provide training for anyone wanting to assist the sacristan.

This month is Chaplaincy Month in the Diocese of Adelaide. To celebrate this, the Rev'd Paul Harris will be our guest preacher on Sunday the 28th of May at 8 am and 10 am. Paul is the Chaplain at Pulteney Grammar and is a parishioner. We look forward to hearing him preach on the day as part of Chaplaincy Month. It was intended that Jacqui Maynard, the Chaplain at the Glenunga International High School was going to speak today. Unfortunately, due to other commitments this weekend, she is unable to do so, and so we will welcome her on another day, on a date still to be finalised.

Domestic Violence Awareness Month and DV Aware Sunday May 4th, 2025



The month of May is recognised as Domestic Violence Awareness Month across Australia, which is a time to raise awareness about the impacts of domestic and family violence, and to promote the importance of prevention and support for victim/survivors. This year marks the first DV Awareness Sunday in the Anglican Church of Australia.

DV Sunday is an initiative of the Anglican Church's Families and Culture Commission—a call to shine a light on domestic and family violence, and to take up a collection so that we can continue to serve well those who are impacted by it in our churches. Domestic violence has no place in the kingdom of God, yet more than 1 in 3 women and 1 in 7 men in our churches report that they have experienced violence, with women far more likely to be impacted by sexual and physical assault and sexual harassment. We cannot stand by, and we thank you for choosing to join us to mark this Sunday as DVSUNDAY in your parish.

We're inviting churches to take part in three simple but meaningful ways:

1. Highlight the issue: Domestic and family violence is present in our churches—some are living with it, others may be choosing it.
2. Give thanks: That God sees and cares deeply for those impacted, and that we as a church are learning to see and care too.
3. Invite generosity: Show our two-minute video and guide your congregation to www.charidy.com/dvsunday to make a one-off donation supporting the Church's work in prevention, response, and healing.
