

The Sentence for the Day

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

A reading from the book of Revelation

After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying,

"Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!"

And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshipped God, singing,

"Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them.

They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes." NRSV Revelation 7.9-17

Pew Reflections

Easter 4 C – Sunday 11 May 2025

• Acts 9.36-43; Psalm 23; Revelation 7.9-17; John 10.22-30

The religious authorities confront Jesus at the Temple, demanding that he tell them unequivocally whether or not he is the Messiah. Jesus doesn't play whatever game it is they want him to play and declares that he has clearly told them but they have not believed. The works that he has done have been in the Father's name but, despite that, they have not believed. They, he unequivocally tells them, are not of his flock.

Father Paul writes – 11th of May 2025 – 4th Sunday of Easter

I welcome you as we come together on this Fourth Sunday of Easter, otherwise known as Good Shepherd Sunday. It is also where we celebrate Mother's Day and give thanks for our mothers. Mothers' Day reminds us of how amazing our mothers are and it is a time to let your mother know how much you love her and how much she means to you. To all mothers, I wish you

every blessing this Mother's Day. We will pray for you as part of the service and we invite you to stay for morning tea after the 10 am service.

As we recognise mothers today, we hear of Jesus caring for his flock, that is the sheep that belong to him whom he cares for. It is one of my favourite images of Jesus being the Good Shepherd. Jesus speaks of the promise of life eternal three times in this passage: they will never perish; no-one will snatch them out of His hand and no-one will snatch them out of His Father's hand. The image of the Good Shepherd is also reflected in today's psalm. Psalm 23 is a much love song of trust and hope in God. It promises God's providence, guidance, protection, nourishment, healing, and the assurance of dwelling with him forever. There is also the promise of eternal life in the vision in today's New Testament reading from Revelation. This passage offered hope to those facing persecution and martyrdom in the early Church. It promises shelter and fulfillment, no more suffering and guidance to springs of living water.

How do we hear these promises today? We fortunately do not face persecution, but we certainly have had misfortunes or suffering in some way. We turn to the Shepherd to guide, sustain, and protect us and who leads us to the springs of eternal life. We also know the peace that comes from the forgiveness of sins, the joy that comes from serving Jesus Christ, and the hope we have of life forever with the Lord, both here and in the world to come. This assurance is what sustains us in faith, in worship and in service. We listen to him also through the scriptures, in prayer and He knows us by name.

This hope is something we are trying to share with others during this church season of Easter leading up to Pentecost. Today, we hold the second of three sessions from the "Hope Explored" course, starting at midday with a light lunch. This session will be repeated next Friday at 6 pm with wine and cheese. This session is focused on exploring Jesus as the Prince of Peace, someone who makes it possible for us to have peace with God and one another. It highlights how Jesus made peace possible with humanity by dying on the cross and in his resurrection. Please join us today or next Friday.

Over the next month or so, we will feature some of the hymns that either won or were runners up in the Hope25 Hymn Fest Competition. They are all focused on the hope we have in God and His Son Jesus Christ. As well, St Saviour's will take part again in the worldwide ecumenical program called "Thy Kingdom Come" in the lead up to the celebration of Pentecost on Sunday June the 8th. It is a time where we particularly focus on praying for five people, who we know and whom we would like to invite to our service on that Sunday.

The new roster for the various positions in the parish will be collated soon for the remainder of the year. The current roster runs out on the 22nd of June. We are particularly keen to hear from anyone who would like to be a reader, an intercessor, a lay assistant, a welcomer or in assisting the sacristan in setting up on Saturday mornings for the Sunday services. Please let me or Sue Lewis know if you are interested in any of these positions. I am happy to provide support and training for anyone wishing to be an intercessor and for anyone wishing to be a lay assistant, that is serving at the 10 am Sung Eucharist. Sue Lewis is also willing to provide training for anyone wanting to assist the sacristan.

I will be attending the Provincial Clergy Conference at Murray Bridge this week. The conference will be attended by clergy from the three dioceses in SA. The keynote speaker will be the Primate of New Zealand, Archbishop Justin Duckworth. He will speak on missional discipleship. There will be presentations also on social trends and sociological changes, inclusive church communities, dementia and spiritual care. It is also a great opportunity to meet up with clergy from across SA. As a result, there will be no Wednesday Eucharist at 10 am and Judy Bowyer will take Morning Prayer on Thursday at 7.30 am. I will be available if needs be by phone.
