

Christmas Reflection

I enjoy the hype leading up to Christmas, with Christmas trees with all the tinsel and fairy lights in department stores and shops. Then there's the music, listening to Christmas songs and carols. There are many great hymns which I love to sing too as we prepare for Christmas in the Season of Advent. It is a time where we hear of the prophets who foretold the coming of the Messiah, including John the Baptist and of Mary being informed by the angel Gabriel that she would give birth to the Messiah.

The celebration of Christmas is a time where Christians around the world come together to celebrate the birth of our Saviour, Jesus Christ. On Christmas Day, there will be one service at 9 am with a Sung Eucharist with Carols. This is a service for all the family with children's activities. The season of Christmas continues until Sunday the 4th of January, where we celebrate the coming of the Wise Men.

In the meantime, the Season of Advent, which in Latin means "Coming" reminds us that we all have another job during the weeks leading to Christmas besides organising the family gettogethers on the day. It is that we "wait for God". Use this season of Advent to be spiritually prepared for this great season of celebration, to step back from our hectic routine, to slow down and contemplate the birth of Jesus, our Redeemer.

Bishop Bradly Billings elected as 11th Archbishop of Adelaide

The Anglican Diocese of Adelaide is pleased to announce the election of The Right Reverend Dr Bradly Billings as its 11th Archbishop.

Dr Billings, currently an Assistant
Bishop in the Diocese of Melbourne,
brings to Adelaide a wealth of
experience in parish ministry,
theological education, and senior
church governance. He has served as
an Assistant Bishop since 2016, most
recently as the Bishop for the
Oodthenong area, which covers the
northern and western growth areas of
Greater Melbourne and extends to



include Geelong. There he oversees 64 parishes and authorised congregations.

Known for his extensive work in parish ministry, and in church planting and revitalisation, Dr Billings' qualifications include a doctorate in theology and a Master of Law in Canon Law.

He succeeds The Most Reverend Geoffrey Smith, who retired in November.

Speaking on his election, Dr Billings expressed his reliance on Christian hope as he prepares to lead the Diocese.

"The hope we have in the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ gives me confidence and faith for the future, despite the many challenges we face as Anglicans and as disciples of Christ," Dr Billings said.

"I firmly believe the Christian faith and tradition continues to be good news for all people, and that making the gospel known in words and in actions is the shared task of all believers." Dr Billings has a strong track record of collaborative leadership and intends to bring a unifying approach to the role.

"I am comfortable with, and respectful of, the full diversity of Anglicanism," he said. "I seek to model ministry that is genuinely shared, and to cultivate quality relationships grounded in mutual trust, respect, and humility. I see myself as a partner in ministry with those with whom I live, work, and share my vocation."

Welcoming Dr Billings' election, Diocesan Administrator Bishop Sophie Relf-Christopher said: "I have been keenly aware of the Holy Spirit's guidance at every stage of the nomination and election process.

"I am delighted that Adelaide Anglicans have elected Bishop Billings, and know that he will passionately encourage the ministry of this Diocese, to the Glory of God. We have every indication that Bishop Billings will serve with compassion, wisdom, and integrity, and herald God's extraordinary love for the world.

"My heartfelt thanks go to the many faithful Adelaide Anglicans who have been praying and preparing for this day, and to the nomination committee."

Before consecration as bishop, Dr Billings served as Archdeacon of Stonington and Glen Eira and as the vicar of parishes in Toorak and Gisborne, and Curate in Frankston. He has also served as the Director of Theological Education for the Diocese of Melbourne and is a published author in biblical studies, pastoral ministry, and church history.

Dr Billings is married to Karen, and they have five adult children and three grandchildren. He is also a devoted owner of a Hungarian Vizsla named Ruby and enjoys Premier League football and history.

Arrangements for Dr Billings' installation at St Peter's Cathedral will be announced in due course.

LECTIO 365 Magazine reflection

The Archbishop of Adelaide Geoff Smith in his final sermon before he laid up his pastoral staff on the altar at St Peter's Cathedral encouraged everyone to download the app Lectio 365. It resulted in a representative from the Uniting Church, to mention while giving thanks to Archbishop Geoff for his comradery and contributions that he had himself downloaded the app onto his phone.

I have used the app over the past two years and have found it to be wonderful, complimenting Morning Prayer. Morning Prayer can be found on another app called Epray, which is also a great resource as part of our daily prayer routine, with scripture readings and prayers. The bible readings for each day for Morning Prayer are listed in the pew sheet also if you use the prayer book. On Lectio 365, there are three devotionals, at morning, noon and night, reflecting the disciples praying with Jesus three times a day.

I came across a morning reflection on epray highlighting the Lord's Prayer which I thought I would share, and with the encouragement for you to also download the app. The devotion of the morning highlights each line of the Lord's Prayer with an explanation....

"Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name"

Lord, I imagine myself curled up, like a child, sitting in my Father's lap. In my own words, I express just one of the many reasons I love you today." *Pause and Pray*

"your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven"

I remember the headlines I've read in the news this week and pick one situation to pray about. Father, what is your will? I ask for the hope, healing, and wholeness of your kingdom to invade that situation. *Pause and pray*

And forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us"

Holy Spirit, please show me two things: some way in which I've let you down, and someone whose wrongdoing I am choosing to hold against them. As I humble myself to receive your forgiveness, soften my heart to in turn forgive them. *Pause and pray*

"and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one"

Father, I think about the day ahead, please strengthen and protect me, in every situation I face.

New Sign

St Saviour's has installed a new sign on its church property facing the South Eastern Freeway. The sign was erected after a very long process in gaining planning and building approval through SA Planning and Burnside Council. The sign follows much confusion over the years with the erection of two large Sikh signs which face



our church property overlooking the memorial garden. The signs are legitimate in their place as they are in the very edge of their property, but unfortunately it has caused many people to think the church is now part of the Sikh temple complex. The sign was erected in July, thanks initially to Sue Lewis and the signwriter Craig Metcalf from Stacks of Stickers and with its erection to Ray Correll and with engineering help, from Brian McKay.

The St Saviour's branch of the Mothers Union held a Christmas lunch at Mary Catford's residence on Wednesday the 27th of November. The annual lunch brings to an end the monthly meetings and activities of the Mother's Union for each

National Meditation Gathering at Glen Osmond

St Saviour's hosted the World Community for Christian Meditation Australia Conference (WCCM) on the last weekend of November 2026.

The conference attracted around 100 delegates from around Australia along with two representatives from Fiji.

About 20 committee members met on Thursday and Friday, before the conference began on Friday night and continued on Saturday.

The conference was titled "Simplicity of Stillness: Living into Mystery with Meister Eckhart" and was led by an international speaker, the Rev'd Dr. Mark Burrows from Canada.

Dr Burrows spoke over several sessions about Meister Eckhart who lived between 1260 AD and about 1328 AD. He was a German preacher who promoted simplicity as the quiet virtue that lives at the heart of things.

Dr Burrows has led many retreats for the WCCM internationally. He is widely known for his spirituality and mysticism and has coauthored three books on meditative poems inspired by Meister

Eckhart's writings.

At a result of hosting the conference, a proposal has been put forward for St Saviour's to run an introductory course on Christian meditation next year.

ABM's 175th Anniversary Celebrations

October 2025 will be remembered for the celebration of the 175th anniversary of the Anglican Board of Mission. It was recognised across Australia including the three dioceses in South Australia.

In Adelaide, it was celebrated at St Peter's Cathedral on Sunday the 26th of October with a celebratory high tea in the Cynthia Poulton Hall, followed by Evensong at the Cathedral, where Archbishop Geoff Smith preached.

The Bishop of Mandalay, David Naing was supposed to be the guest speaker at the High Tea but was unable to gain a visa. Instead, the ABM spoke of where it has come over the past 175 years and its future direction for the next 25 years.

This included a presentation from the National Aboriginal Bishop, Chris McLeod, the Chair of NATSAIC, Cameron Burr and the ABM's Key Relationships Manager, Meagan Schwarz.

As well, St Saviour's was represented at the 175th anniversary celebration at St James, King Street and at Parliament House in Sydney, where Fr Paul and Helen Devenport and Mary Catford attended.

The anniversary evensong was held on the same day and at the same church where the Anglican Board of Mission was formed on the 29th of October 1850.

The Primate and Archbishop of Adelaide, Geoff Smith preached. The service was attended by Partner Bishops from the Philippines, Papua New Guinea, Myanmar, Korea, Hong Kong and Melanesia and NATSAIC representatives.

Around 300 supporters from across Australia along with international partner representatives attended the Evensong and the dinner at Parliament House.







Cemetery Report

The annual cemetery newsletter was sent out to 99 (mail) and 136 (email) contacts in September.

Donations – several were received in reply to the newsletter.

Annual Working Bee for Friends of the Cemetery was held on Saturday 25th of October in the morning and included morning tea kindly provided by Sue Lewis at 10.30am in the Parish Hall. 16 people attended which was lower than usual but luckily the rain and wind arrived later in the afternoon.

The Burnside Council installed a Blue Heritage plaque for the cemetery just before the working bee. It is next to the white wooden gate on Pridmore Road and mentions the hitching rail nearby.

A large gum tree branch fell in October but was cleverly removed by Dave Monceaux and Ross Bray.

A quote was accepted for the restoration of monuments as was John's wish. 20 varying styles of headstones and monuments were either restored or secured. The work was completed early in April by Ken Slater Memorials. The appearance and safety of



the cemetery have been greatly



improved. One grave is now back to its original shape, and the other has had the surrounds removed and the headstone set back on the grave so that it is not affected by the large gumtree.

PlanSA

Some of the trees (self-established years ago) in the cemetery are causing damage but they will continue to grow as they are River Red Gums (Eucalyptus camaldulensis). Their mature height and width are not suitable in a heritage cemetery with monuments and access being compromised. To address this problem, in February I applied to PlanSA to have three of them removed. These trees are listed as significant in the new PlanSA specifications because of their size and species. Arborman Tree Solutions presented a report with understanding of the heritage and significance of St. Saviour's cemetery versus the 3 trees. The total cost of the arborist report and application to PlanSA was \$1,345.00. The application was rejected by Burnside Council.

Volunteers are needed to help keep the cemetery tidy for only an hour at flexible times, with rakes supplied.

The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings at 5 pm for an hour and for a quick practice on Sunday morning before the 10 am Eucharist.



The connection between St Saviour's and the Cathedral Organs

St Saviour's has the fortune of having an excellent pipe organ which needs constant maintenance to keep it properly tuned. Some of the pipes were installed in 1927, some of them were from St John's Anglican Church in Wagga Wagga in NSW. The pipes were gradually added with a complete set finished in 2005 by an organ specialist, George Stephens.

Much of this latter work on the St Saviour's organ was carried out by George Stephens in 2001 and 2005 with the addition of many extra pipes for the organ. There are now 988 pipes installed. George was also responsible for an upgrade



of the pipe organ at St Peter's Cathedral in 1989, with the installation of a 32 foot Contra Trombone, pictured on the next page.

This was installed in memory of musicians associated with the cathedral. These full-length pipes are sited opposite the main organ chamber in the liturgical south transept where the first organ once resided. These pipes are not the largest pipes in the instrument, this title goes to the 32ft Double Open Diapason, whose pipes are big enough to climb inside and stand at the back of the main organ chamber.

In 2017, the organ was shipped back to England to the workshop of Harrison & Harrison Ltd of Durham, where it was comprehensively overhauled at a cost of \$1.7m. Four new stops were provided and the 32ft Contra Trombone was revoiced; these tonal revisions being based on the original pipework scaling are perfectly in keeping with the original 1929 tonal aesthetic organ.

While the romantic style and character of the 1929 instrument has been preciously safeguarded, it has been equipped with modern playing aids to allow the cathedral musicians to have an instrument fit for today's liturgical requirements. The instrument remains as one of the grandest and substantially musically unaltered organs in Australia, making it one of significant historic importance.

The organ was rededicated on Sunday 2 December 2018.

Bequests to St Saviour's

Bequests are a great way to ensure a lasting legacy. You can include the Anglican Parish of Glen Osmond in your Will to help future faith generations and the ongoing Mission of the Church. Our Parish has an outward mission focus as well as a commitment to support the spiritual life of our congregation.

Leaving a bequest is a very personal decision and it is important to look after your loved ones first. It is also good to discuss your wishes with those closest to you such as family and friends. Your Will is a very important document, and it is important that it reflects what you want.

When leaving a bequest or gift to the Parish, contact your Executor (family, executor trustee or solicitor) to let them know that you would like to include this in your Will. They will ensure the right wording is used based on your wishes. Please note that bequests can only be made to the Synod of the Diocese for the benefit of a particular parish or ministry.

The Anglican Diocese of Adelaide has a policy on Bequests and the recommended wording to be used is:

I give and bequeath (description of gift, eg specific amount or percentage of estate or balance of estate) to The Synod of the Diocese of Adelaide of the Anglican Church of Australia Incorporated for the use and benefit of the Anglican Parish of Glen Osmond, 596 Portrush Road, Glen Osmond.

You may also specify if you wish the Parish to use the funds for a specific ministry or leave it to the discretion of the Parish Council.

The Anglican Parish of Glen Osmond has been very fortunate with the generous bequests in the past. Every gift, no matter how small or large, is important. For more information, there is a pamphlet on bequests in the narthex of the church.
